## TOGG Tales

My first memory of The Old Gray Goose is from a weekend leadership camp my high school sent a group of students to in September 1992. I remembering sitting around a campfire listening to him take us "on a lion hunt".

The following summer was my first year on staff and when the chance to camp out, with Goose and some campers, in woodsman's village came up, I jumped on it. Goose guided the group in building a lean-to, gathering wood, building fires, and melting wax to make fire starters. As traditional woodsman, we slept outside on tarps to keep the dew from soaking into the sleeping bags. The next morning I awoke, off the tarp and my sleeping bag was soaked inside and out! Needless to say I was a little chilly. In fact it wasn't until late afternoon, when I was finally able to take off one of the five layers of clothing I had on in an attempt to bring my body temperature back somewhere near normal. As I set my jacket aside, I remember looking up and hearing Goose exclaim, "Woo whoo! I thought we were going to have to boil you to get you warm again!"

The following summer, 1994 started with the sudden passing of my father, just weeks before my high school graduation. It was also the summer Goose brought back a Woodsman Village style canoe

trip on the Erie canal. Thanks to a great friend who knew I needed to get out of the daily camp routine, I was given another opportunity to spend more time with Goose and 4 other campers. (This time I had a waterproof sleeping bag!) We spent the week sleeping in tents or under our canoes. We took turns searching for fire wood, building camp fires and cooking. While the food wasn't all that memorable, one of my favorite memories was watching Goose's reaction as he crunched the rice I had cooked for dinner. I can still hear him, in between crunches, say, "Maybe next time, let the water boil before you add the rice."

During the days, as we navigated the canal, Goose would tell stories. It seemed he was always guiding us in some way or another. The most memorable lesson for me that summer came after we had gone bridge jumping. As I wrapped my arms around my life vest and stepped off the bridge, curiosity got the better of me and I looked down at the water just as I entered. When I swam back up to shore and climbed out of the canal, Goose looked at me and chuckled, "I guess I should have told you not to look down". Lesson learned. I don't remember much from that summer, but I do remember how great it was to listen to tales that took my mind a million miles away anything sad.

# Letter From the President: The President's Challenge!

At the last two Goosestocks "WE" have accomplished so much. Attendance at the annual event has grown by leaps and bounds; donations have exceeded even the most optimistic outlook.

So, thank you for helping us bring new life to the Friends of Camp Kenan. One debate the Board has been having over the last few months is regarding a new donation drive. We want to know if we can make the organization more of a year round commitment. In the fall we have Goosestock and raise a good amount of money to give back to CK, but what about the spring or early summer?

One idea being tossed around is to come up with membership plan or a spring donation drive. The idea is that in March or April we would ask all former staff to join and become a member of the organization. The membership fee, a 100% tax deductible amount, would be a small

amount, maybe \$20 to \$50 for the year. We even discussed having members receive some benefits like a "Friends" window decal, or shirt, and allow members to vote and elect Board members. We have decided to table this idea and discuss this during our business meeting at GS12 so that we can hear from all of you.

The point of bringing this idea to the table is to raise money for CK in the spring that can be given right back that year. Personally, I was not ready to give up on the fundraising idea for this year just yet. In fact, I have been sitting here looking at a bill we have from our lawyer in Lockport for almost \$2,000. This bill represents one of our final costs in getting Friends of Camp Kenan set up as a 503c not-for-profit, which means we can more easily get donations from corporations and we can guarantee the tax deductible donation status.

Yes, we have money in our account to pay the bill; however, if we do that our contributions back to camp this year will not be very large. My challenge to all of you is to help me raise money this spring to pay off this bill and thus help us donate more back to CK this summer.

I will match up to the first \$750 that is donated to the "Presidents Challenge" to help cover our legal bills. You can donate any amount, and every dollar helps. Donations must be made by April 30<sup>th</sup>, 2012, and please write in your memo of your check "Presidents challenge donation" so that we can track the dollar amount. I hope you take a few minutes and consider making a donation to help both the Friends of Camp Kenan and Camp Kenan itself.

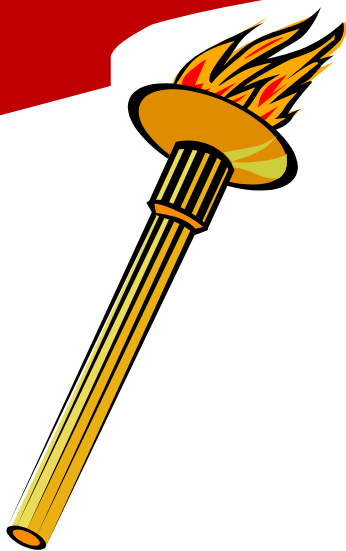
